Crimes and Law Enforcement

THE BELOW LISTED INCIDENTS WERE SUBMITTED BY INDIVIDUALS OF BAYVIEW STATION:

MONDAY 10/23/2006, 10:40PM, Shafter and Lane Streets - Crack Cocaine Arrest, Parolee at Large Arrest (Case # 061133228)

Officers Altorfer and Alcaraz were assigned to the Bayview Violence Reduction Unit last Tuesday and patrolling the area of Lane and Shafter in response to neighborhood complaints of drug activity in the area. As they passed the corner of Lane and Shafter Ofc Altorfer recognized one of the two men standing on the corner as a man he had previously encountered; Ofc Altorfer knew that the man is currently on probation for narcotics sales.

In California if someone is released early from jail on probation OR parole one of the conditions they must agree to in order to get released early is warrantless search by any police officer at any time, day or night.

Knowing that the man he had seen was on probation for narcotics sales, Ofc Altorfer decided to detain the two men and investigate. While Ofc Altorfer and Ofc Alcaraz didn't recognize the second man he WAS hanging out with a known drug dealer, so they asked him his name. The man gave them his name and a computer search revealed that he was a parolee, and that he had a warrant out for his arrest for a parole violation. Apparently, birds of a feather DO flock together, because after Ofc Altorfer and Alcaraz placed the parolee under arrest and searched him they found him in possession of crack cocaine. The first man was released and the parolee was booked, along with his narcotics, at Bayview Station. Another example of how Bayview Officers keen observation skills combined with knowing the people in the neighborhood can help clean up our streets.

TUESDAY 10/24/2006, 2:00PM, International Studies Academy (ISA) - Vandalism Detention (Case # 061138767)

Ofc Torres is one of the hardworking School Resource Officers (SRO) dedicated to keeping Bayview schools safe and helping our kids find the right path. As an SRO you have a greater responsibility than just enforcement you try to find alternatives in order to keep our kids out of jail. So when Ofc Torres responded to the Principal's office at ISA

regarding a kid caught "tagging" gang graffiti in his classroom, she knew she had a prime candidate for intervention. At the office, Ofc Torres met with the principal, the boy's guardian, and the boy himself. The kid said he didn't have any reason for what he did, he just did it and Ofc Torres did not recognize him as a gang member or problem at the school. So she worked it out with the adults - the principal agreed that the boy could make it up by cleaning up graffiti at the school, and the boy's guardian agreed to allow the boy to visit San Quentin as part of the SQUIRES program, San Francisco's version of "Scared Straight." As a result of the alternatives that Ofc Torres came up with, the boy was not arrested but offered a way to make up for what he did as well as given a chance to see what happens to those who choose a life of crime. TUESDAY 10/24/2006, 7:16PM, Newcomb and Newhall Streets - Possession of Crack for Sale (Case # 061136573)

One reason cops are so cautious during traffic stops is because you never know how it will turn out. After all, criminals drive cars too, and they do not like getting caught. But they are generally a little smarter than the guy that Ofc Haynes and Reyes pulled over last Tuesday for running a stop sign at Oakdale and Newhall. Once Ofc Haynes got the man's Driver's License they found out that he was on probation, which makes him AND the car searchable. So when Ofc Haynes asked the guy if there was any contraband in the car, the guy said that all he had was money in the center console of the car. Ofc Haynes looked, and sure enough, there was money - a lot of it - all covering up the large plastic bag full of crack cocaine. Of course we all know that the man and his crack were booked into custody at Bayview Station. But what about the 3 grand the guy was carrying around at 7PM at night in the center console? It was seized as evidence - the presence of large amounts of money in small denominations along with narcotics is a pretty good sign that the guy is a drug dealer. And yes, Ofc Haynes also gave the guy a ticket for running the stop sign.

THURSDAY 10/26/2006, 5:57PM, 3rd and Wallace Streets - Stolen Vehicle, Possession of Heroin, Possession of a Prohibited Weapon, and Conspiracy Arrest (Case # 061135973)

Ofc Olson was recently transferred from Bayview Station. He is gone, but his legend lives on - because he volunteers to come back and work in the Bayview as part of the Violence Reduction Unit. Ofc Olson also has an almost superhuman mystical power to find stolen cars. So when he and his partner for the night Ofc Anderson heard the radio call regarding a stolen U-Haul van at 3rd and Wallace they were on it in a flash. They found the van parked and a man standing next to it leaning in the driver's side window

talking to the driver and passenger in the van. Officers Pashby and Hastings also responded as backup and the three were then detained. As Ofc Olson was identifying the man who had been talking to the driver, he saw something drop out of the man's pocket. It was a film canister, and when it hit the ground the top fell off and spilled the several packages wrapped in balloons. Ofc Olson recognized these packages as heroin because they are commonly used by drug dealers to transport heroin; Ofc Olson placed the man under arrest and found more heroin in his pockets. Meanwhile, Ofc Hastings found a billy club on the passenger side of the van where the female passenger had been sitting. All three were transported to Bayview Station, where the drug dealer was also found to be in possession of a large amount of money in small denominations. The three were booked at Bayview Station along with the evidence. As long as Ofc Olson continues to make these kind of arrests, he can come visit us anytime!
